ANNUAL CHEVRA MISHNA DINNER - SUNDAY, DEC. 2nd

An annual event, the Dinner will be followed by a "Siyum" and entertaining program. Election of officers will also take place.

Members of the Chevra Mishna and their wives are cordially invited to attend.

CHANUKAH IN YOUR HOME

1. OBSERVANCE

The celebration of Chanukah begins on the 25th day of Hebrew month Kislev (Wednesday evening, Nov 28,) and lasts eight days. On each succeeding night of Chanukah, an additional candle is lighted, making eight in all.

2. KINDLING THE MENORAH

Place the Menorah in a conspicuous place in your home. If at all possible, have all the members of your family present at the ceremony of the lighting of the candles.

Light the "Shamash" candle first, and with it light first the candle on the left. Move toward the right. On the first evening of Chanukah, one candle is kindled. It is placed on the far right of the Chanukah Menorah, as one faces the Menorah. On the second night and on each succeeding night the candle far that particular evening which is to the left, is lighted first. Thus, on the last night of Chanukah, the 8th candle is kindled first then the 7th, and so on, moving toward the right.

On Friday evening, November 30th, the Chanukah condles are kindled before the lighting of the Sabbath candles.

Since the ceremony of lighting the candles is the most significant phase of the Festival, it should be observed in reverence and solemnity. The entire family should remain standing around the Menorah as the father lights the "Shamash." As this candle is held, the following blessing is chanted or recited: BO-RUCH ATOH ADONAY ELOHEYNU MELECH HA'OLOM ASHER KIDESHANU BEMITZVOSOV VETZIYANUH LEHADLIK NER SHEL CHANUKAH. ["Blessed art Thou O Lord our G-d, King of the Universe, who has sanctified us by His commandments and has commanded us to kindle the Chanukah lights."]

"THINKING ALOUD"

The startling and astounding news that emanated from the Middle East during the closing days of October shook the capitols of the world. Entrance of Israeli troops into the Gaza Strip and the Sinai Peninsula and the military endeavours of the British and French governments to hold and safeguard the Suez Canal have evoked bewilderment the world over. Indeed, world-shaking events have come to pass in the cradle area of civilization.

As American Jews, dedicated to the welfare of our country and the future of the United Nations, we are vitally interested in the destiny of our brethren in the Republic of Israel. As Americans, the foreign affairs of the United States are of as much concern to us as domestic policies. What, therefore, are the factors responsible for the current epoch-making events that have perplexed the world?

Walter Lippmann, outstanding authority on world affairs, has best characterized the present crisis:

"When the Israeli army struck on Monday, the President and his advisors decided, quite rightly, to take the affair to the U.N. But there were two ways of taking it to the U.N., and they chose the wrong one.

One was to seize the whole border problem, to recognize that it is a two-sided problem, and to call for measures to restrain the Egyptian raids as well as the Israeli reprisals. The other way was the one which the President and Secretary Dulles took. This was to ignore the Egyptian raids, to treat Israel as the aggressor and Egypt as the innocent victim.

This was a grave mistake of policy, indefensible in principle and in fact entirely unrealistic and impracticable . . . The resolution which Mr. Lodge submitted to the U.N. would, had it been adopted, have guaranteed the Egyptians behind their frontier but not the Israelis behind theirs. It would have made Egyptian territory a U.N. sanctuary from which the fedayeen raiders could operate without fear of reprisal. His (Nasser's) behavior convinced the Israelis that they could not live with him . . . he is the typical aggressor dictator who will not stop until he is stopped. That is why once again a policy of appeasement has failed to preserve the peace."

Israel merely exercised its sovereign and inalienable rights of self-preservation and self defense. To have done less would have amounted to cowardice and suicide!

It is with deep satisfaction that we make mention of the tremendous growth and progress of our congregational week-day Hebrew School.

Our enrollment has been increased by almost sixty pupils over last year. The new semester brought 107 beginning students, of whom 53% are boys and 47% are girls. At present there are 289 regular students in the Hebrew School, taught by six full time instructors and one part-time teacher. For the first time in our history, two Hebrew High School classes are conducted, each group meeting three times a week. Most encouraging is the fact that girls comprise a significant percentage of enrollment—131, or 44%!

These are some of the enlightening and optimistic signs of our times!
